## Armed Services

### Keeping Families Connected

Private First Class Melissa Siler, stationed in Ft. Sam Houston, is the sole support for her disabled husband, Gary, and their three children. One of the children, Bradley age 14, has cerebral palsy. The family was living in a home without any utilities connected for a few weeks before they contacted the Red Cross. They were in need of financial assistance to establish electrical and propane service to the home, repair their automobile, and make the bathroom wheelchair accessible for Bradley. With the assistance of the Military Aid Society, the Red Cross was able to help this family meet their needs.

Through their world-wide network of communications, the Red Cross helps keep American families in touch with their military loved ones. They also make it possible for military families and veterans to receive financial assistance. From July 01, 2006 to June 30, 2007, the Greater Ozarks Chapter sent 840 emergency communication messages for military families and provided an additional 152 social services. Briefings were provided to 3,010 service and family members.

## Disaster Services

### Meeting the Needs of our Neighbors

It all happened so quickly for Twylla Farr. Not more than 5 minutes after she left her house to return some videos, her 14 year old son was calling 911 to respond to a fire that started in a fuse box. Twylla remembers the fire trucks passing her while she was out. When she returned, the house was burning. She said “The Red Cross was there in less than 30 minutes, they were there before my mom got there.” The Red Cross provided shelter, food and clothing for Twylla and her 2 children. They also provided emotional support. Nothing was salvaged except the items her son managed to carry out of the house while it was burning.



When disasters occur in our community, the American Red Cross is there to provide help and hope. From July 01, 2006 to June 30, 2007, the Greater Ozarks Chapter responded to 407 incidents and helped over 1600 people devastated by fires and other disasters. In addition we touched the lives of over 200,000 community members during the ice storm by providing sheltering, feeding and distributing life-sustaining supplies.

Your Greater Ozarks Chapter maintains a Disaster Response Team available 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

## Health / Safety Services

### Training the Community to Save Lives



For Bella, age 5, reaching out to help another was something that came naturally. When her 2 year old sister, Claire, ended up under water in a friend's pool, Bella went under, grabbed her by the arm and pulled her to safety. As the two children held hands and walked towards their mother, Bella said “Claire almost drowned and I pulled her out.” The day before the incident Bella had been in a Red Cross swimming class taught by Nancy Green. The class focused on what to do if someone needed help in the water.

The American Red Cross teaches life-saving skills through a variety of classes including First Aid, CPR (infant, child, adult, and professional rescuer), AED, lifeguard training and babysitter training. Babysitter's camp was a huge success, training youth, ages 11 through 15. In addition to learning CPR and first aid, they had several guest speakers and participated in easy-to-make crafts.

Health and Safety trained 12,176 individuals in life saving skills and trained an additional 6,138 in disaster preparedness education. Staff and volunteers also distributed more than 18,000 disaster readiness education materials.
